

ENV-101 in Oncology Clinical Trial FAQ

Q: Are there clinical trial sites close to me? Do I have to travel to get treatment?

A: We try to make receiving clinical trial treatment as convenient as possible for you. To find clinical trial sites close to you, go to clinicaltrials.gov and search **NCT05199584**. This will show you a list of all our site locations. In addition to the sites listed, we may be able to locate and open a site closer to you. Please contact our partner xCures by scanning the QR code below for more information.

Q: What costs are covered, and will there be additional costs to expect?

A: Study drug tests and medical care required as part of this research study will be provided to you at no charge. Your insurance company may be billed for some of these charges if they are considered standard of care, but you will not be responsible for the cost of any study procedures.

Q: How do I take the study medication?

A: You will need to take 2 or 3 tablets by mouth at the same time each day, prior to eating. You may take the tablets with a small glass of water. If you experience any nausea or other gastrointestinal symptoms, you can take the tablets with a low-fat meal or prior to bedtime.

Q: How often will I be seen by the study doctor?

A: You will need to come into the clinic approximately every month once you are enrolled in the study.

Q: What are the most common side effects?

A: Some commonly reported side effects to the study drug, ENV-101, are muscle cramps, altered taste, weight loss, and sometimes nausea or vomiting.

Q: What if I have side effects or am not feeling well?

A: Please contact your study doctor, who will work with you to help manage your symptoms. If you experience any life-threatening reactions, please get emergency medical care immediately.

Q: What happens if I get a placebo?

A: There are no placebos in this study. Everyone who enrolls in this study will receive the investigational study drug.

Q: Have other people taken this drug?

A: ENV-101 is an investigational drug, meaning it is not approved by the FDA for any disease. Thus far, approximately 200 people have taken this study drug in clinical trials.

Q: Who can I contact if I am interested in joining this study?
